Welcome to our first newsletter! As a church and parish, we have identified several goals for 2024! One of those goals is to improve communication within the church family. Meet Bertie, our Curate

I believe I have met most people in the Barming and Teston congregations now, but despite being terrible with names I do recognise faces so please keep reminding me your names when we meet, and hopefully I will get the names and faces correctly attached in my brain by the end of my three-year curacy with you all.

I was ordained a Deacon at the end of September last year, in Rochester Cathedral, and as I'm working parttime I still feel pretty new to it all though have now been with you all for almost four months. I just looked up the word curate and the definitions include "a member of the clergy appointed to assist a parish priest", someone who "carefully chooses, arranges, and presents different items in order to get a particular effect" and "an assistant barman". I'm very much looking forward to the latter part of my training. If you want to know more about my current role I suggest you do an online image search for the following terms: "Dave Walker curate cartoon" and you will have a full pictorial job description (except the barman part, about which Mr Walker is curiously silent).

Here's some stuff about my life and if you want to know more, then I drink decaf tea or coffee without milk and my working days are Thursdays, Saturdays and Sundays.

I grew up in Dorset, with my parents and older brother. I worked on an organic farm which, unbeknownst to me at the time, was good practice for my later calling to the Church, as it involved a lot of being on my knees, though this was on flinty soil, weeding around the tiniest of seedlings which we would later harvest for the farm shop and veg boxes.

Sometime in my teens, two significant events were attending New Wine, where I experienced God for the first time, as being a real loving presence in my life rather than just something I knew, in my head, to be true. The other was my father losing his job and then sometime later getting employed at The Pilsdon Community in Dorset. I spent time there volunteering and it has given me a love of intentional Community life and a need for social justice.

I went to the University of Kent, in Canterbury to complete my degree where I learned about my lecturer's penchant for cats as they often turned up in his lectures/slide shows, and the joys of a good farce.

I joined Milites de Bec, a Norman re-enactment group and had a lot of fun travelling around the country performing as a spearman in many battles and

cooking authentically using a cauldron over an open fire. No baked potatoes in the embers though, as it was well before they'd been brought to this country.

On completing my last exam, I promptly moved out of student digs and into The Pilsdon at Malling Community in West Malling where I began as a volunteer and left as a Community Member after 4 years there. There was a wonderful sense of balance in the self-sufficient nature of the place where we grew, cooked and ate our own food, where we worked, celebrated, lived, laughed and prayed together. It was also very challenging as we shared our lives with people who had had so many difficulties in their lives and relationships and often hadn't had a model of how to live well and struggled with learning that it was possible after so much heartache and hardship.

During this time I met my now husband when I went to learn how to ride my motorbike (very much a God story for another time), and when I left the Pilsdon at Malling Community I began work at Ticehurst hospital - a psychiatric hospital which is part of The Priory (another God story) which then led on to my mental health nurse training.

Whilst doing this I lived in several guardianship properties which was a way to keep empty buildings secure from squatters but gave us cheap accommodation albeit with very short notice periods to move. I began in a fabulous farmhouse in Crowhurst, then a care home in Hawkhurst and then an ex-dementia hospital in Bobbing. Somewhere in the middle of this I completed my nurse training, married Woody, and moved to Linton.

In Linton I began seriously exploring the call to ministry (another long, God story) and that has culminated in my being in Barming and Teston, learning many more new things and preparing me for some kind of ministry in the future.

I am so happy in the Parish and feel so welcomed and loved already. It is such a blessing to be with you all in this stage of my life and journey so it just remains to thank you for all the help and kindnesses you have shown me thus far, and here's looking forward to the next lot of adventures together.
